Expectations and content

What is this unit about and why do we teach it?

This Atmospheric Writing unit is dedicated to exploring and appreciating literature. We teach a love of reading in all units but this unit explores the skills of great writers whilst learning to adopt these techniques into our own writing.

Key Skills taught:

- Creating effective immersive settings through use of language devices, vocabulary and mood.
- How to use sentence lengths and structures to create different effects.
- Create 3 dimensional characters and make them interact with the setting

If your child needs support

Suggested activities to help:

- One way to improve your creative writing is by experiencing the work of great writers. You should increase your reading and try out some of the recommendations.

- Increase your vocabulary. Look in a thesaurus at synonyms for words that you may use too often like: sad, scary, bright, depressing.
- Practice using language devices (find these on the MEGA MAP)
- Practice planning your writing (using the models used in lessons)
- Practice editing great writers do not become great writers from their first draft. They recreate their work constantly until it is just right. You could do this by changing the sentence structures you've used, add in punctuation, add sophistication with vocabulary. Plan extended metaphors and parallels.

Questions to discuss with your child:

- What makes creative writing special?
- What genre of fiction interests you the most?
- Discuss your favorite fiction novels.
