Expectations and content

What is this unit about and why do we teach it?

 This unit looks at fiction from a new perspective. Pupils will have been used to primarily looking at fiction from a language point of view, this unit opens their eyes to consider the craft of structure.

If your child needs support

Suggested activities to help:

- Revise the structure for 'FWSRE' by using the mnemonic 'Frogs Went Snowboarding Round Everest.
- Consider watching clips of movies (like we did in class) to consider why the story unfolds the way it did. Consider the following questions:
- What is the first thing you see? Why? Does that image come up again?
- What does it change or shift to? Why might it have moved?
- Does the perspective change (setting, inside/outside, pace, person?)
- How does the clip progress? What do you find out?
- How does it end and does it link back to anything from earlier?
- Read novels and treat each chapter in the same way (as above).
- Try to spot any of the structural techniques (to the left) which may be used in the novel that you are reading.
- Try out some of the techniques when you are writing - see if you can create a flashback, for example.

If your child needs extension

Questions to discuss with your child:

- What are the different ways a writer could open an extract?
- Why might a writer decide to include a flash-forward?
- What examples have you come across of good anchoring of a subject in a novel?

Challenging activities to complete:

- Whilst reading your current novel, try to analyse the use of the structural devices which the writer uses - consider what they use and why they may use them. How do the techniques link to the context?
- You could analyse the structure of a whole novel instead of just an extract. Consider why the writer may change the techniques over the whole novel. You could also look out for patterns.
